

## Postcard from the Past

When packing to move to Muswell Hill, Zoe Norfolk's grandfather told her that she had ancestors who lived in Muswell Hill - three great great aunts, one great great great uncle, and one great great grandmother who all lived in Muswell Hill in the 1920s - in three different flats on the Broadway near Barclays Bank. One even ran a men's boarding house adjacent to the bank. This is a copy of the postcard that was sent from Queenie to Dolly in Australia. By looking at the dates, we believe the card to have been posted around 1923.

### Lewis Slayden, proprietor of Flesh & Flour

Lewis will talk about the rise in the production of British Charcuterie. Until recently charcuterie was only associated with trips abroad to Italy and Spain. This is slowly beginning to change. Why is this?

### **Emma Williamson, Haringey Council**

Emma will talk on the planning process in general and, in particular, how to object effectively to planning applications both in conservation areas and otherwise. She will also cover what steps can be taken in the event of consent being granted or refused, and the measures available in the event of a breach of planning legislation.

Emma is currently the Assistant Director of Planning at Haringey Council. Before this she worked at the GLA and CLG and for a organisation in Southwark which assisted the local community in getting involved in the planning process. Emma has more than 20 years experience of working in planning and is a longstanding member of the RTPI. She is also a non-practicing Barrister.

The Council are beginning a programme of sessions to assist community groups in getting involved in the planning process, how to best make representations on planning applications and how to make the most of speaking at planning committee.

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### **Gardening at Coldfall Primary School**



For the past two years I have been helping in the school allotment on Friday afternoons with year 4 pupils aged 8 and 9 years. This is an ideal age as their energy and enthusiasm is real and they love to ask questions. Getting out of the classroom to get stuck into weeding, turning the soil, planting and harvesting at the end of the week seems a pleasure. The school encourages the pupils to garden as there is not only the regular allotment session but also a drop-in lunchtime session and an after school club for years 1 and 2. A parent, Eva Beresford, is the leading light in these activities and I work with her.

To see the pupils' delight in seeds pushing up through the soil, edible leaves flourishing or the first fruits ripening is heart—warming. Their reactions on finding worms, caterpillars, spiders and centipedes is sometimes surprising – a mixture of curiosity, fear, wonder or even revulsion – and can be a challenge. However, an explanation of the life cycle of an insect or telling them how far worms can go into the soil and their value often helps. The bolder ones will handle the insects that they find and are persuaded to treat them carefully.

Picking the ripe fruit is a favourite activity and even a few strawberries shared with a group of fifteen is a special treat. Sometimes we give them a few herb leaves to take home for their families and at other times the harvest is cooked and shared in the class. Plants are harvested for school fairs and we have grown our own fruit bushes from cuttings for sale too.

The children learn how to co-operate together on the gardening tasks and also have the sciences of biology and botany brought home to them in a practical way. Many of them do not have a garden and have only a rudimentary understanding to begin with of how plants grow and where their food comes from. It is a pleasure to work with them and see their growing understanding of nature and our environment.

### **Traffic News**

### New pedestrian crossing

The MHFGA has long campaigned about safety for pedestrians crossing the road by the junction of Fortis Green and Tetherdown. Improvements are at last being made, scheduled for completion on 10<sup>th</sup> March. There is now to be an exclusive pedestrian phase at the lights.

This is particularly important for those crossing Fortis Green where, before the change, there was no period when it was possible to cross the road without danger from passing vehicles. The exclusive pedestrian phase will enable the removal of the staggered crossing over Fortis Green Road and people will be able to cross the road in one movement. Associated with the work is the installation of double yellow lines along the south side of Fortis Green to prevent buses being stuck here between parked cars and vehicles waiting for the lights.



### **Bald Faced Stag lights**

Some good news from London Borough of Barnet Highways Department about the traffic lights at the Bald Faced Stag, although it appears not before 2018/19:

'The traffic modelling undertaken for the A1000 / East End Road / Fortis Green junction suggests that introducing a right turn indicative arrow to allow traffic to turn from the A1000 High Road (south) into A504 Fortis Green after southbound traffic has stopped, would provide benefits to junction operation in the afternoon peak period, although there would be disbenefits for traffic on some arms of the junction.

'Subject to anticipated funding being approved we expect to develop a detailed design that includes this change (and other adjustments) next financial year [i.e. April 2017 - March 2018]. Implementation would be likely the following financial year.'

A Men's Shed is a larger version of the typical man's shed in the garden - a place where he feels at home and pursues practical interests with a high degree of autonomy. A Men's Shed offers this to a group of such men where members share the skills and resources they need to work on projects of their own choosing at their own pace and in a safe, friendly and inclusive venue. They are places of skill-sharing and informal learning, of individual pursuits and community projects, of purpose, achievement and social interaction. A place of leisure where men come together to work. A Shed's activities can involve making or mending in wood (e.g. carpentry, joinery, turning, carving, whittling, marquetry, furniture renovation) and may include activities as varied as bike repair, gardening, vehicle repair, tool renovation, upholstery, boat renovation, model engineering, milling, turning in plastics, etc. Reclamation,



reuse and restoration will feature strongly - and some say that is true of the men too! Whatever activities are pursued the essence of a Men's Shed is not a building, which some don't have, but the network of relationships between the members.

### Aims and objectives of the Freehold Community Men's Shed

The Freehold Community Men's Shed is open on Mondays and Tuesdays between 10.30am and 3.30pm at the Freehold Community Centre, 9 Alexandra Road, N10 2EY. The primary focus of the Shed will be to provide a place where men can meet to socialise and share their experiences and skills with each other. Any activities will be based on what members want to do, but with the purpose of supporting each other, the work of the Freehold Community Association and the community at large. 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### **Smart Meters**

Thames Water (TW) is rolling out smart water meters in London and telling customers that this is mandatory.

On further investigation it turns out to be a rather grey area, with the Government telling the public that they will never make metering mandatory even in an area designated under water stress. TW are saying that as this area has been designated under water stress, they have the power under the Water Industry Act 1991 S162 to force us to have smart meters.

However, the Act only talks about 'meters' not 'smart meters', hence smart meters are not covered by the Act. Smart meters are different from analogue meters in that they will read and collect customer data on their water usage in real time and relay it to TW. Computer modellers will be able to tell who is in the house, and when and what their habits are. It would be possible to hack in to the meter, which is a security risk and we have a right to privacy inside our own homes.

The calculations on the Thames Valley being an area of severe water stress are questionable and need to be challenged. For over 10 years there has been a plan to bring water to London from the Severn that TW seem not keen on. This would easily cover the calculated shortfall. Less than 1% of the UK rainfall is collected for human consumption so it seems that TW have manufactured an apparent shortage and are keener on spending billions on smart meters rather than infrastructure.

The German utility industry has stated that there is no business case for smart meters. They are about data collection and surveillance.

You have a right to refuse them on the grounds of no consultation being offered and not consenting to having your private data collected.

## **Kyriakos George Karageorgis**



Kyriakos George Karageorgis, most often called George, sadly passed away Saturday 7th January 2017 at the age of 57.

George was born in London on 16th February 1959, the son of Maro and George Karageorgis from the village of Lefkoniko in Cyprus. His father was one of the

founders of the famous Greek restaurant Elysee in London's West End. George attended Highgate High School and went on to graduate from Hull University with a degree in Economics.

He then joined the family business but soon after opened his own restaurant, the T-Bone Steak House in Barking, which he ran for 17 years. In 2009 he became the owner of the Clissold Arms Gastro pub in Fortis Green, Muswell Hill. George, who was well known for his charismatic character, built the Clissold Arms into a hub of the North London Community where local societies and charities would hold their meetings and events. It was named Best Family Pub in London and the South East in 2014-2015 and 2015-16. He also raised funds for his favourite charities Mind and MacMillan Nurses.

The Clissold Arms is also the home of The Kinks, having hosted their first gig in December 1960, and their last gig in June 1996. In their honour, The Clissold Arms Kinks Room is adorned with Kinks memorabilia and is the pride of Kinks fans all over the world

He leaves behind his beloved parents Maro and George; his two children, Victoria and George; their mother Tracy; two sisters, Nevi and Rea; and many relatives and friends.

George was a loyal and huge supporter of MHFGA and many meetings and events were held in The Clissold where George was in attendance all the time. He was very proud to be a member!
