Muswell Hill Library Saved!



The Friends of Muswell Hill Library are obviously delighted to hear the news that Haringey Council have decided not to go ahead with their plans to move the library to an inappropriate site which would not have been visible from the Broadway. This decision shows that Haringey are no longer committed to sacrificing library services in the borough for the sake of selling of public buildings. They must be congratulated for performing this U-turn.

Over the course of two long years, the Friends committee worked tirelessly to inform local residents of what it would mean to let Haringey move our wonderful library into the proposed new site, which is right at the top of one of the steepest hills in London, with no disabled parking spaces in the vicinity. Several residents with mobility problems told us in response that they would no longer go to the library if it moved. We would also have lost our purpose-built, Grade II listed library which has been in use since 1931. It would have been sold off to the highest bidder, almost certainly to make way for yet more multi-million-pound flats.

We want to emphasise that it was community action that saved our library. We, the community, won the argument. In 2016, over 3,000 people signed our petition within a fortnight of its launch. 71% of local residents opposed the Council's plans in their official Public Consultation last summer. We relied on the support of numerous people and organisations, including our fantastic local newspaper the Ham&High, Friends of Reading and Education (FORE!), Muswell Hill & Fortis Green Association, 38Degrees, Chris Roche of 11.04 Architects, our MP Catherine West, our local Councillors (both Labour and Lib Dem), but most importantly of all, our members at the Friends of Muswell Hill Library. We came together as a community, and we have proved that when we all work towards the same goal, change really is possible.

Member in Profile

Joyce Rosser

Chris Barker and I first came to Muswell Hill in 1986 having previously lived in other parts of north London. We had a large three-storey Edwardian house in Alexandra Park Road which we shared with various children and friends. We were both working full-time so didn't get much involved in the local community.



Things changed in 2000 when we gave up our jobs and downsized to a 1920s house at the bottom of Muswell Hill. Not long after I went to a meeting of the Warner Estate Residents Association and found that they were looking for someone to be secretary. I thought 'why not?' and volunteered. I was lucky because WERA is a lively group and there have been all sorts of activities over the years. In addition to setting up the Friends of Priory Common we now have the wonderful Priory Common Orchard by the Redston Road bus stop.

Of course as anyone who has joined a committee will know, you can quickly find that you get involved in other groups and projects. So I soon became active in Haringey Federation of Residents Associations, Sustainable Haringey and Haringey Friends of Parks Forum. With Ken Gay of Hornsey Historical Society I tried unsuccessfully to get the frontage of the Hornsey public baths building listed. One of my main claims to fame for several years was organising the very popular 'Compost Giveaways' in the Paddock car park in Alexandra Park.

But a big change came in 2007 when I offered to be HFRA Heritage and Conservation Officer. I decided to focus on Tottenham because I knew that there were active Civic Societies and Conservation Area Advisory Committees in the west of the borough but at that time there weren't any similar groups in the east. I had lived in Tottenham for a short time in the early 1970s and knew that it had a rich history.

By coincidence a new group called Tottenham Civic Society had just been launched. I made contact with them and, because I was retired whilst most of the TCS people were still working, I offered to be TCS Events Organiser as well as Tottenham CAAC Secretary.

Hence for the past ten years I have been heavily involved in Tottenham. The High Road is a microcosm of English history – Roman road, aristocratic estates, merchants' grand houses, churches and nonconformist chapels, railways and factories, deindustrialisation and deprivation, and now gentrification and 'regeneration'. We run tours of conservation areas, visits to listed and new buildings, and tours of old and new housing estates such as Broadwater Farm and Hale Village. For several years we did a tour called 'Spurs and rebuilding after the Riots'. We developed three cross-borough walks – Alexandra Palace to Bruce Castle (Alexandra Palace was in Tottenham until 1888), The Moselle River and The Palace Gates to Seven Sisters Railway (copies in local libraries or can be downloaded from the Friends of Parks website). I'm also one of the many shareholders in the Antwerp Arms, the wonderful community-owned pub near Bruce Castle Museum.

Alexandra Palace News

Update on the East Wing Restoration Project

There is currently no update on the new timetable for restoring the BBC Studios and the external landscaping in the East Wing area, the two parts of the original project that have been deferred. It is worth noting again that these are dependent on a further Heritage Lottery Fund application. The ambition for the BBC Studios remains to create an interactive celebration of the history of broadcasting and the BBC at Ally Pally, together with an exploration of cutting edge broadcasting and technology. Regarding the work underway, a Planning and Listed Buildings Tracker is being used to monitor progress on discharging the approval conditions and regular liaison is taking place with Haringey's Principal Conservation Officer and Historic England. Completion of the East Wing (minus the BBC Studios and external landscaping) is still expected to be summer 2018.

Other Ally Pally News

The Alexandra Park Grounds license has been granted by Haringey on the condition that the original request for 42 event days be scaled down to 30, in line with what some neighbourhood groups campaigned for. The majority of events, 24 days out of 30, will be small-scale for less than 5,000 people. In the first year, the Trust will focus on 11 event days, and the majority of these are smaller events. There will be three larger events, the annual fireworks display, Red Bull Soapbox Race and the Summer Festival, all of which have been held at the Park & Palace before. In addition to the varied range of activities aimed at local schools, the Palace has started working with some local day care centres and dementia support groups. Projects so far include Spring Sensory Strolls in the Park, held during Dementia Awareness Week in May.



Forthcoming events

The Fireworks Festival on 4th and 5th November, a Christmas Panto from 4th to 11th December and the Darts championship running from 14th December to 2nd January 2018. Have you noticed more people coming to the area? The Friends of the Park have been helping the Palace fine tune its estimates of the number of visitors. For the early part of 2017, the measures suggest that visitor numbers are up 12% on last year.

Finally...

I have been invited to join the Board (in a non-voting capacity) as one of the three representatives from the Consultative Committee (CC). Although I normally sit on the Statutory Advisory Committee, I also hold the Association's position on the CC so I'm looking forward to getting much more involved.

St. James Church Community Café

The Community Café was launched 8 years ago in 2009, with the idea of being a welcoming community hub in Muswell Hill. The aim was for St. James to open its doors to everyone. Hannah Whitehead was appointed Head of Community Ministries and has been looking after the Community Café since August 2016. She has forged partnerships with Planet Organic, Marks & Spencer and Sainsburys.

The church offers work experience for those with learning difficulties through the Action For Kids charity (who have been awarded the On The Up award for being an inclusive partner); Treehouse School (for young people with autism); Haringey Council; and Barnet Council. There is a group prayer at the beginning of the morning and then a prayer from Michael and also a 'quiz' event for everyone to participate in. After these activities lunch is served which has been made and prepared by these young people and is always healthy and delicious, usually, soup or pasta with side dishes.

MHFGA member and regular customer, Joan Podel, says "It is a joy and a privilege to be involved with and befriend people each Tuesday morning, and to see people of all ages working behind the table which is laden with baked goods of all types, serving tea and coffee and, most of all, always smiling and finding it a joy to assist with this table. Each week I stay longer and longer as I feel so at home. This is really the most special of places. It is enjoyed by all!"




Transport News

After lobbying by local people and the Warner Estate Residents Association, the council are at last installing a pedestrian crossing in Priory Road near the junction with Redston Road, making crossing of this dangerously fast road safer. At the same time the bus stops here have been renamed. The previous name of Alexandra Park was confusing because it is not in the park and, on the W3, there are other stops which are. The new names are Priory Road (for the W7 on Park Road) and Park Road for the W3 and 144 on Priory Road.

Buses entering Fortis Green from Fortis Green Road are often unable to get through a narrow gap between cars waiting for the lights to change and cars parked on the opposite side of the road. A double yellow line has been drawn there but a disabled bay prevents this from being continuous. Following representations by the association it has now been agreed by the council that the disabled bay should be moved around the corner into Fortismere Avenue. The work should be done soon.
