Important Planning News

John Baird Pub, Fortis Green Road

Permission has been granted to extend the building, including the provision of an additional storey to accommodate 7 self-contained flats. The aim seems to be that the new building will look like an enlarged version of the present one. One point which was of concern to many was how the Council would be able to hold the applicant to account concerning its statement that the pub use on the ground floor will continue. It was therefore good to see that a condition has been included in the planning permission which requires the ground floor to have been fitted out as a pub before the residential units can be occupied.

412 Muswell Hill Broadway – the former Woolworth building

Permission has been granted for the conversion of the first and second floor levels of the existing building to the front, the construction of a third floor to the front and additional storey to the rear to provide 9 residential flats above the ground floor commercial unit involving the creation of a basement level and alterations to the front elevation façade. The decision is disappointing as the Association had objected to several aspects of the proposal which we believe will appear unduly prominent in relation to the surrounding streetscape.

1-9 Fortis Green Road

The proposal to redevelop the single storey shops opposite Sainsbury's and build 6 flats above caused an enormous amount of

Robin Lustig



We moved to Muswell Hill in 1982 and have lived in the same house ever since. There was never really any doubt that we would buy it: when the estate agent told us it was owned by a certain Mr Rosenthal, who turned out to be none other than the playwright Jack Rosenthal, who was married to Maureen Lipman, how could we not snap it up there and then?

I harboured a fantasy – correction, I still harbour a fantasy – that by sitting in the same upstairs room in which Jack had written some of his most successful plays, I would somehow be inspired by the same muse that had inspired him. I have even written a play of my own, but so far the evidence suggests that Jack took the muse with him when he and Maureen moved round the corner to Colney Hatch Lane.

Muswell Hill in the 1980s was a quiet suburban backwater with one Greek restaurant and no cafés. Without a presence of its own on the Tube map, it was north London's invisible suburb – as a result, the houses were a good deal cheaper than those in better-known Hampstead or Highgate.

For us, that was a large part of the attraction. It also had Alexandra Park and those fabulous views over London. Even today, more than thirty-five years later, the views still take my breath away as I take my regular morning stroll through the Grove, past Muswell Hill School, where both our children were educated before going on to Fortismere, and along the Parkland Walk to Highgate Wood, where I commune with nature and admire the ever-changing light-scape of that magical, historic woodland.

As a journalist and broadcaster, I was often on the road, reporting from far-flung places. But Muswell Hill was always home, and as soon as I got back from a reporting trip, I would trot up to the Broadway to check that my favourite shops were still there. If ever Martyn's were to vanish, I would know that all of human existence was in peril.

These days, there are far too many estate agents for my taste, but Martyn's is still there, thank goodness, and the DIY shop by the bus-stop opposite Clark's shoe shop is a blessed Aladdin's cave where we have been able to find anything from a curtain hook to a door-stopper.

I was working for The Observer when we moved here; then, in 1989, after three years away as the paper's Middle East correspondent, I moved to the BBC, where for the next twenty-three years, I presented The World Tonight on Radio 4 and Newshour on the BBC World Service. I left the BBC in 2012, since when I have been a freelance writer and broadcaster. In 2017, I published a memoir called 'Is Anything Happening?' (available, of course, from Muswell Hill Bookshop), and I now spend two afternoons a week as a volunteer reading helper at Bounds Green Primary School.

The state of our local shops

Calling on those who have lived in the local area for more than 30 years.

I'm running a North London U3A (University of the Third Age) project to look at the history and current state of our local high streets. The intention is to use it as a pilot for a nationwide study to take place later this year, after I've reported nationally on the local study.

Why am I doing it? Partly because it's a worthwhile project to engage the oldest in the community (not necessarily U3A members), and partly because I'd like to encourage local people to focus more on the future of their shopping streets, which societal pressures, notably but not exclusively internet shopping's rapid rise, are in danger of transforming into centres that are largely for personal service only: cafes and take-aways, nail bars and beauticians, betting and payday loan shops, at the expense of shops that sell things, and community services like libraries. The U3A's constitution bars it from campaigning on such matters, but that's no reason why U3A members can't join - or start - local pressure groups.

In November I produced a detailed summary table of the current and past shops in each of two major centres: both sides of East Finchley High Road from the station to Creighton Avenue and the Broadway and Fortis Green Road in Muswell Hill. Unfortunately Muswell Hill can be confusing because road names have changed and some street numbers' direction has reversed.

What I'd like to do next is gather groups of people who have known specific shopping streets for a long time to:

1. Walk the streets and list the shops there now. You can do this surprisingly quickly, but if you don't feel like tramping the streets you can skip this stage. It is, however, very educational.
2. Use online directories and archives to plot changes since my (not entirely arbitrary) start point of 1937. I'll guide you and/or participate. Again, you can skip this if you don't fancy it, and jump straight to 3.
3. Gather a group of local residents (from 3-10) at my house or in a room at the appropriate archive (Muswell Hill library or Bruce Castle museum) to 'walk' down the virtual streets together, furnished with old maps, photos - and your own recollections. Doing it together should spark buried memories.

I shall then write a report for the national U3A, aiming to encourage groups to carry out something similar later in the year. I'd aim to write the whole project up in early 2020.

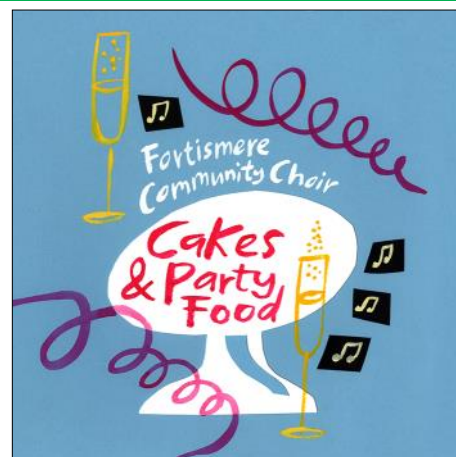
Fortismere Community Choir

Ultra low emission zone



London's Ultra-Low Emission Zone is coming into operation on 8th April. Initially the zone covers the Congestion Charge Zone but will operate 24 hours a day and be extended to the North and South Circular Roads in 2021. The intention is to take the most polluting vehicles off the road and drivers of non-compliant vehicles will have to pay a daily charge (£12.50 a day for cars). Broadly the restriction applies to petrol cars registered before 2006 and diesels more than five years old. You can check whether your car is compliant by entering the registration number through

Car park charges at Ally Pally?

The charitable body that runs and manages Alexandra Palace and Park recently announced its intention to consider introducing charging for car parking. Although these are early days, and a full consultation will be carried out in due course with local residents, visitors and stakeholders, you may have already read about the idea in the local press or via word-of-mouth. It is worth reading the announcement on their website:

In short, the main reason is that car park charging could generate income to cover the costs of maintaining and improving the Park and Palace facilities. Despite good progress over recent years, in particular the opening of the newly restored Theatre and East Wing, most visitors to this world-famous attraction probably feel that the Palace could do with more money to spend on these improvements, including managing the car parks better and deterring anti-social behaviour.

Of course, the impact on local residents will largely depend on how charges are implemented as well as their price structure. Casual local users of the park are very different from visitors to all-day events coming from further afield. Changes of this nature also have an impact on neighbouring areas, as we've seen following the recently launched CPZ areas in parts of Muswell Hill.

Whilst local residents will have the opportunity to share their views with Ally Pally directly when the consultation happens later in 2019, we would welcome any comments and questions from members in the meantime.

News from Muswell Hill Sustainability Group

If you've lived in or near Muswell Hill for a while, you'll probably have heard of our group. Perhaps you've seen one of our stalls while doing your Saturday shopping on Muswell Hill Broadway, or visited one of our 'Green Open Homes'. We've been running for 10 years now, helping local people live more sustainably in a way which meets both current and future needs. We work with other local groups and Haringey Council to cut carbon emissions from homes and transport, reduce household waste – especially plastics – and encourage local food growing.



Our community energy company, eN10ergy, has installed solar electric panels on Marks and Spencer on Muswell Hill Broadway, Muswell Hill Methodist Church and on local schools. These generate both electricity and an income from feed-in tariffs to support our work. With other local organisations we campaign for positive change, such as divestment of Haringey Council's pension funds from fossil fuels and other action to tackle climate change. We offer a range of free events and information to help householders save energy. 'Hot Tips For Warm Homes' energy-saving advice sessions suggest low-cost steps, while visits to local energy-efficient homes provide inspiration based on real life experience. We also offer 'Woodstove Wisdom' workshops to advise on home heating using woodstoves and a local wood supply, thermal imaging surveys to detect heat leaks, and a list of local installers of energy-saving products and services group members have found trustworthy.

In 2018 we asked local people and businesses to cut use of single-use plastics. Nearly 600 individuals pledged to stop using plastic bags, cutlery, food containers or straws, while a dozen cafes and restaurants joined the Refill campaign offering free tapwater refills.

Our 2019 programme offers more exciting activities to build on the plastics campaign, raise awareness of sustainable food production and consumption, and encourage local householders to 'green' their homes. In April we'll be taking part in the Extinction Rebellion network's international week of action, and throughout the year members can attend speaker meetings, film nights and social events.

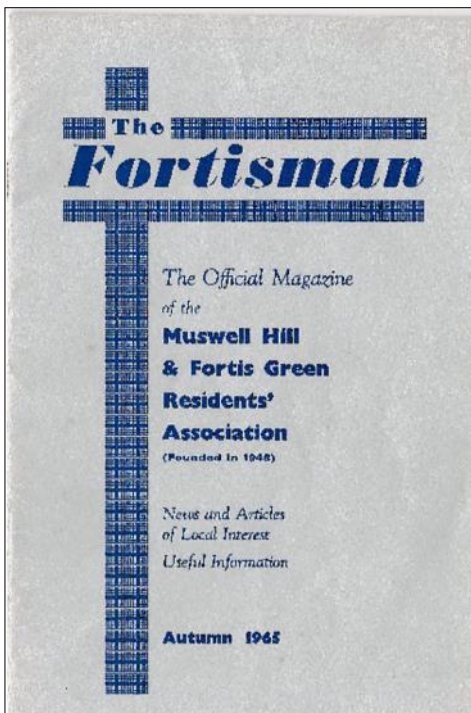

In this occasional series, we will take you back into the past history of the MHFGA and, in this first article, we reproduce the editorial from the Autumn 1965 issue of The Fortisman, a forerunner of our current Newsletter.

Haringey Ward Boundaries review

All ward boundaries in Haringey are being reviewed by the Boundary Commission as part of their normal process to ensure that electoral wards within a borough have roughly an equal number of electors. We believe that any changes will be put in place for the next council election in 2022.

The Commission sought submissions and suggestions from members of the public and local organisations during December and January. They will now draw up some initial plans and will consult the public on this from the end of April until the beginning of July. This will be the stage at which the Association, and our members, are likely to wish to get involved and make a comment or submission. We will be in touch with further details at to exactly how to do so, nearer the time.

Although we do not yet know exactly which boundaries the Commission will suggest, we do know that the wards in the West of the Borough currently have too few electors (compared to over-populated wards in the East of Haringey) and so the areas they cover will need to be enlarged. It is likely that the area covered by the Association, which currently consists of three wards, will end up being reduced to two and a half wards, with the 'half' being the Northern portion of the current Alexandra ward which may be merged with Bounds Green ward.

Pinkham Way

Last October, Haringey's Regulatory Committee, under its remit to examine complex planning issues, considered the draft North London Waste Plan (NLWP). After reading and hearing evidence from PWA (Pinkham Way Alliance), and questioning officers, a cross-party majority of members, unwhipped, recommended to Cabinet that the Pinkham Way site be removed from the plan.

To put it very mildly, this decision sent Council dovescotes a-flutter. The Cabinet meeting scheduled for a few days later was postponed for two months to 'give time to line up support'. Cabinet members made alarmist and wholly inaccurate comments that Haringey would be forced to prepare its own waste plan if it didn't approve the NLWP (i.e. if it exercised its right to remove the site). When the matter finally came to Full Council on January 31st, the Council could only ensure approval by whipping Labour members.

So what did that meeting actually approve? One thing only, that the draft plan should be sent forward for a six-week public consultation that will begin shortly. Later this year or early in 2020, an independent Planning Inspector will examine the NLWP's soundness. It goes without saying, of course, that anyone has the right to make a response to the consultation.

For those who don't wish to, PWA will as usual prepare its own submission, which, under a long-standing agreement with the NLWP, we'll invite you to support after studying detailed bullets of the main points.
