Do you fancy a Walk in the Woods?



Coldfall Wood consists of 14 hectares of ancient woodland on Haringey's western boundary with Barnet containing several streams, a seasonal pond, and a bank and ditch made long ago to prevent animals from entering the woods. The main stream runs north, then passes via a culvert under the playing fields, eventually joining Pymmes Brook. Stone and fossil deposits suggest that the wood marks the southern tip of Ice Age glaciers.

Until 1930 the wood was almost twice its present size, extending to Fortis

Green, but much of it was felled for residential development. The trees are mainly oak standards and hornbeam with some birch, hazel and wild service. The woods had probably been coppiced since Roman times. This is the practice of cutting trees near the ground to foster and harvest the new growth. By 1990 the consequences of decades without coppicing was a dense mature tree canopy stifling germination of woodland floor vegetation and limiting habitats for wildlife. From 1991 a small reintroduction of coppicing was followed by larger ones starting in 2006. Creating glades and an east-west 'ride' helped to let in light, later revealing the emergence of over 150 new seedlings such as trailing St John's wort and square-stemmed St John's wort, not seen elsewhere in Haringey.

A collaborative partnership between Haringey's nature conservation officer and other conservation bodies like the Woodland Trust, TCV (Trust for Conservation Volunteers) and Friends of Coldfall Wood and Muswell Hill Playing Fields worked together on a management plan and to source major funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund and others to implement it. Provision and improvement of paths, signage, benches and information boards, clearer vistas, good access points that allow wheelchairs, and re-built bridges led to Green Flag status in 2009. The regenerated wood has many ancient wood indicator plants such as wild service tree, wood meadow grass, wood speedwell, early dog rose, wood serge and anemone. The wood supports at least 32 species of fungi and a large variety of invertebrates including the rare lesser glow-worm. New reed beds filter pollution and offer habitats for grey wagtail and mallard. Nature reserve status was gained in 2013.

May/June 2019

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Volunteers play an important role in preserving the wood. TCV regularly do maintenance and clearing work. Coldfall School not only have lessons in the woods but also do litter picking. The Green Gym even did a nocturnal litter pick wearing head torches. The Friends of Coldfall Wood run themed walks for adults and children on topics like herbs, geology, invertebrates, fungi, trees, bats, the dawn chorus and tree dressing. On these walks it is not unusual to discover a new resident, whether beetle, plant or fungus. The Friends raise funding for amenities like bat boxes, have just funded a bird survey and welcome new members.

Coldfall Wood is first and foremost a habitat for wildlife; we are visitors enjoying its beauty, colour, scent and sounds through the changing seasons. We gain peace and tranquillity. But we are also its guardians: ancient coppiced woods cannot be replaced. Let us take away only a photo, leave behind only a footprint.

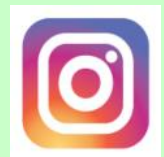

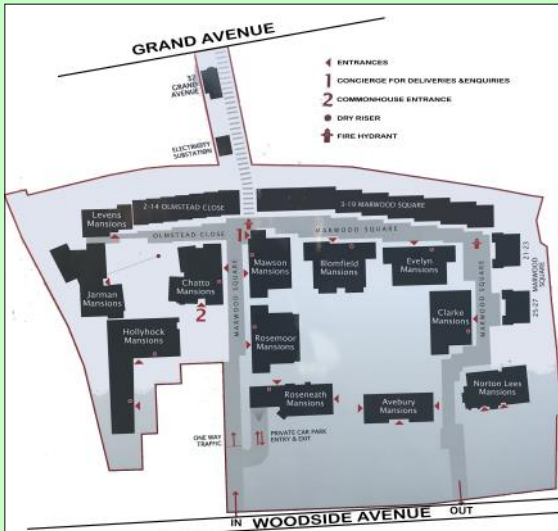

Member profile: Alison Watson

I am a Londoner born and bred but only discovered leafy Muswell Hill when I married in 1962 and we moved to a house in Wood Vale, a wonderful house and garden to bring up three boys.

My initial training in social work was at the London School of Economics and Boston University, and later I gained an MA at Brunel University. I first worked in Bermondsey during the years when families were being moved out to garden cities with very mixed results. Later I worked for Haringey Council as Development Officer for children for 13 years, long before the scandals, and in 1986 that led to helping to set up a charity for adults on the autistic spectrum, the Hoffmann Foundation for Autism which still has residential provision and a day centre in the area – in fact an art exhibition was flagged up in the last edition of this magazine. I became Chair of Trustees retiring this year. After retirement from Haringey I went back to work for another London borough overseeing contracts for adults with special needs.

Life now is very different and wonderfully rich. I am on the Committee of the Friends of Queen's Wood which, because it is owned by Haringey, has no paid staff so I help with membership and the newsletter. Volunteers are the eyes and ears of this beautiful nature reserve. Behind the Lodge Café in Queen's Wood there is a community garden where I am a volunteer gardener once a week.

I also belong to North London University of the Third Age (U3A) and greatly enjoy belonging to a book group which reads everything not English, so there are many challenges in translation.

I have been going to a class "The Shape of London" for fifteen years, and for U3A I lead a group called "Historic London Walks" which explores interesting corners within the Freedom Pass area. We are about to do our 101st walk!

Then there is music; I have been a member of the Highgate Choral Society for 25 years and feel immensely fortunate to still be allowed to sing. I also walk with the local Ramblers as often as possible.

Last year my husband celebrated his 90th birthday at another local and surprisingly little known spot, the Muswell Hill Bowling Club, a green oasis in the middle of houses.

Over the years, opportunities arose to buy bits of adjoining land, giving me and my husband Earl, both artists, the impetus to create a unique evolving garden, full of fun, with a temple, pagodas, an oriental teahouse, carp pond, lawns and plants. Our garden has been featured in books, including *Ornament in the Small Garden* by Sir Roy Strong, and on TV programme *Britain's Best Back Gardens*, presented by Alan Titchmarsh.

The more we enjoyed it, the more we wanted to share it. Since 1996 we have opened three times a year for the National Garden Scheme raising £100,000 for nursing and caring charities. The benefits gardening have contributed to our well-being are manifest. It is officially acknowledged that even *being* in a garden enhances one's health. Recently, we invited groups who might not otherwise have the opportunity. Holocaust survivors, carers, beneficiaries like Macmillan, Marie Curie and Maggie's, patients and doctors, have enjoyed glorious afternoon tea parties. These are special occasions for us all, made possible by the support of our "dream team" of generous spirited volunteers.

Meeting with local police teams



On Friday 22nd February the local police teams for the West of Haringey gave a talk and a Q&A session at Hornsey Town Hall, at the request of the Muswell Hill and Fortis Green Association. The meeting was well attended with about 60 people present. Inspector Rhona Hunt outlined how the police believe that they have caught the culprits responsible for some of last autumn's burglary spree, and that there will soon be arrests relating to muggings of teenagers on the Broadway. She also gave details of various crime prevention measures that the police are sponsoring, including a discount code for 'RING' camera doorbells and measures to secure sash windows, which are by far the most common method of illegal entry into houses in this area.

Inspector Hunt came across as very knowledgeable, helpful and competent and many of those present were impressed by her. However, questions from the audience indicated that there is still a systemic problem regarding information flow between local residents and the police. At the heart of it, many people are not yet aware that they can call their local police team on a dedicated ward phone number, and equally they can email a dedicated ward email address. For the benefit of our members these are included at the bottom of this report.

Some residents at the meeting also asked about the 101 phone number. The Inspector was clear that the most efficient way to report a crime is online at the Met Police website, www.met.police.uk. She assured us that every crime reported online through the website flows through to the same system as a crime reported via 101. The only difference is that it is much faster - waiting times for 101 are very long.

Haringey Borough Cyber Crime Annual Summary - 2018

In 2018, 786 reports were made to Action Fraud costing a total of £2,010,170 (an average of £2,557 per report).

Online Shopping

Victims are tricked into paying money for items that don't exist or are counterfeit when shopping online, for example fake adverts on eBay.

Never pay via direct bank transfers, always use the website's recommended payment method.

Advance Fee

Victims are encouraged to pay an advance fee with promise of a larger amount back in return, for example a scam email from the "Tax Office" stating that the victim is owed a refund for overpayment of tax, but requesting an admin fee first.

Never give your bank details or personal information following an unsolicited email.

Investment Fraud

Victims are pressured in to making "investments" that don't actually exist or have no chance of the financial return suggested.

Genuine investment companies do NOT cold call people. Seek impartial advice.

Payment Fraud (also known as Mandate Fraud)

When transactions between a genuine seller and consumer are intercepted and payment details are altered to an account controlled by the fraudster, for instance a builder having their email account hacked, and a fake invoice being sent to a customer.

Always check changes in payment request via a trusted method. Be wary of out of the blue requests for money, even if it's by someone you know.

Two other frauds are Courier Fraud and Push Payment Fraud.

Victims are called by fraudsters pretending to be police, tax office or from the victim's bank and convince them to give their card details over the phone. Or in some cases, transfer money to a "safe account", buy gift vouchers or to go and withdraw money as part of an "investigation". The fraudsters arrange for a courier to pick up the victim's card or cash to take it away for "evidence".

Your bank, the police, or tax office will never ask you to attend your bank, withdraw, transfer or pay money over the phone or send couriers to collect your card or cash. Nor would they ask you to buy goods or vouchers. This is a scam.
