## Colney Hatch Lane Beds 10 Years On



Ten years ago, in October 2009, the Association submitted a "Making the Difference" bid to Haringey Council for funding to turn the two sad looking grass verges on Colney Hatch Lane (see photo) just north of the junction with Pages Lane into proper flower beds and to make them an attractive and welcoming gateway on the approach into Muswell Hill. Our bid was successful and with the help of Association members and Sunshine Garden Centre we arranged "dig-ins" to transform the grass verges into new flower beds complete with shrubs and flowers.

Not everything went smoothly. The front page article of our November 2010 Newsletter titled "Dirty rotten thieves!" recorded that on the night of 24<sup>th</sup> October 2010 thieves struck and stole six of the large new shrubs we had planted the previous weekend. Undeterred, members rallied round and came forward with donations of money and new plants and a second "dig-in" was organised to replace the shrubs and plant additional plants and bulbs. The "dig-in" team included our Chairman John Hajdu, members Jenny Kruss and Susan Bennett and our Environment committee member Brian Livingston.

Roll forward 10 years and the beds are now full of mature shrubs and plants and give a lot of pleasure to the many people who pass by on a daily basis. We regularly arrange maintenance visits undertaken by members to keep the beds in good shape and last month we undertook a major pruning and tidy up of the beds and also installed a new rock edging. Fittingly we were assisted with this work by two gardeners (*Matthew and Fabian – pictured*) from "The Avid Gardener" which is owned by Mark Falconer - Mark previously worked for Sunshine Garden Centre and he helped us establish the beds 10 years ago.

Our thanks to John Sparrow for his kind donation which, at John's request, will be used for planting some of the flower beds which the Association looks after.

## Members' Meeting, November 2019

On Thursday 7th November, we were delighted to welcome Nick Peacey, secretary of the Friends of Highgate Roman Kiln, who told us about the history of this fascinating artefact on our doorstep in Highgate Wood.



In 1971, during the excavations of the Roman pottery manufacturing site in Highgate Wood, Nick was a teacher in a comprehensive school in Hackney. His timetable included Latin and Classical Studies. This interest led to an invitation to be part of an experimental archaeology project exploring Roman pottery making methods, using kilns reconstructed on the model of Kiln 2, the best preserved of the ten kilns found. He talked about the different types of pottery that were found in the excavation and the distinctive patterns that make 'Highgate Ware' easily distinguished from pottery made in other parts of the country.

Since then, Nick has built and fired a series of kilns using clay and wood from Highgate Wood. We heard the story of the kiln experiments, the technical difficulties (mostly) overcome, the possible connections between the methods of Roman potters and the medieval charcoal burners, and the way in which Kiln 2, a unique survival, has come to be in store in Bruce Castle Museum, unseen by the public. As a result the Friends of Highgate Roman Kiln was formed to fundraise and plan for the return of the kiln to the Wood and for a range of exciting community and learning activities that will support its exhibition.

## Member Profile

### Ann Jungman, children's author

Muswell Hill is in my blood. My earliest memory is of my mother taking me to Highgate Wood to play and paddling in the small pond in Queen's Wood.

That was just the beginning. I went to Hornsey High School which was then right at the bottom of Weston Park. In those seven years Muswell Hill loomed large. At the time I regarded it as a dreary suburb and felt sorry for the poor people who had to live there. This view of Muswell Hill was widely shared: anyone who has read Helen Dunmore's excellent *Exposure*, will recall that the main characters live in Muswell Hill because it is the most dull and respectable place they can find. This is of course in the 1950s and all has changed since then. Until central heating became widespread in the 60s, big Edwardian houses were unheatable without the servants, who had previously dealt with fires in every room. So the very thing that makes Muswell Hill desirable today, i.e. the wonderful range of Edwardian housing, was a downer then.

However, Muswell Hill had its attractions even in those days. There were two cinemas, the wonderful Odeon and the Gaumont at the top of Muswell Hill itself. In the days before TV was in general use, one often went to films three times a week, at the ABC in Archway, the Odeon and the Gaumont. So, much time was spent in Muswell Hill, made all the more appealing because a couple of the boys from Stationers School sold newspapers outside the cinema on Saturdays. We never dared to speak to them of course, but it was enough that they were there.

Then there were the school trips to the Odeon. All the local schools were dragooned to go and see *The Coronation* and *The Conquest of Everest* and every Shakespeare film that came on. So there was *Richard III*, *Henry V* and *Hamlet*. Although we were completely segregated, there was a thrill in the boys' schools being there too.

But the huge Muswell Hill magnet was the coffee bar. In the 50s teenagers hung out in the new cappuccino-selling coffee bars that sprang up. Teenagers were invented in the 1950s, and coffee was king. In the previously tea-drinking nation a cappuccino seemed the ultimate in sophistication. The nearest one to me was in Muswell Hill, I think it was called "The El Toro" and there were posters of bullfighting on the wall and they played rock and roll music. What a thrill, so daring, so wicked and there were boys there and sometimes they even spoke to the girls. Wow!

My other teenage contact with Muswell Hill was going to the Jewish Youth Club in a lovely old Edwardian hall where Sainsbury's is now. Life was much more local then and so many people had weddings, parties and celebrations there.

Now I live in the suburb that I felt sorry for and I love it. I sit in my study and write my books, wander out and shop in our lovely and functioning high street, drink endless cups of coffee in all the eateries that have sprung up, still go to the cinema here and meet friends. My beautiful flat is Arts and Crafts and, post central heating, Muswell Hill is full of interest and stimulation. Two bookshops, great cafes, friendly shops where people know you, Highgate Woods and Ally Pally (still a television centre in my youth) nearby, what's not to like?



## Planning Matters

### 76 Woodland Gardens: a story of perseverance

I suspect that most members are not aware that Woodland Gardens is an area earmarked by a local group as being suitable for consideration for an extension to the Muswell Hill Conservation Area, and even fewer are aware of the saga that has been played out concerning 76 Woodland Gardens. In many respects the story encapsulates why the area should be included in an extended Conservation Area. The property is typical of the area, being a double-fronted Edwardian villa with a gabled bay and the architectural detailing that is typical of its type.

In August 2018 an application was submitted for the demolition of the building and its replacement with a bland modernistic rendition that failed to respect the Edwardian spirit of the original. As the house is in a prominent position the site is especially sensitive and the design particularly problematic. Together with 59 other individuals and organisations, the Association submitted a detailed objection. The application was subsequently withdrawn and a revised application made in the following December which attracted almost 90 objections, including a further objection by the Association. This second application was refused on appeal and a third application, made in May 2018, was refused in July as the proposal "would fail to make an acceptable architectural response to the site, and would fail to respect local context and character". A fourth application was made in April 2019. Although this was marginally more sympathetic it contained many contentious elements and, after attracting substantial opposition, including a petition with in excess of 180 signatories, it was refused in the following June on substantially the same grounds as the previous application. A fifth and final application was made in June 2019. This envisaged the retention of the original road-facing facade with development taking place behind it, including a controversial heavily glazed and modernistic rear. This proved acceptable to Haringey which granted conditional consent in September.

The perseverance shown by the applicants and those who sought to retain the character of the area resulted in a compromise that could have been achieved earlier had there been constructive dialogue between all parties at the outset of the project without incurring what can only be assumed to be substantial costs.

## Alexandra Palace Parking

In February 2019 Alexandra Park and Palace Charitable Trust announced that it was considering introducing charges for car parking. Since then the Trust has worked with independent specialist advisors to develop a proposal. At the end of last year, our stakeholders, beneficiaries, visitors and local residents were asked for their views on the proposal via an online survey. The Trustee Board sought the advice of the Advisory and Consultative Committees as part of this process. There were also a series of informal drop-in sessions for members of the public to share their views and discuss the proposal with members of the team.

After collating the responses, and if the Trust decides to progress the proposal, charging could be introduced at some point in 2020. In this case it will be necessary to apply to the Charity Commission for permission to apply charges.

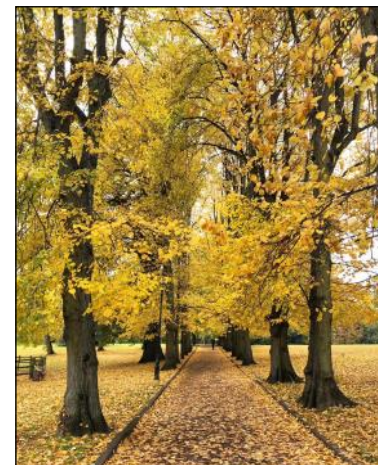

## Safer Neighbourhood Ward Panels

### *a valuable local service for our local community*

The Metropolitan Police organise their local policing under the umbrella of 'Safer Neighbourhoods'; our local police officers work in small teams looking after ward areas and in this way they get to know the locals, including of course those operating on both sides of the law. The wards are exactly the same as the voting wards, so, for the MHFGA area, there are three wards: Muswell Hill, Fortis Green and Alexandra. Currently we have two Police Constables and a Community Support Officer for each ward. You may see them walking around your ward from time to time and you will meet them if you attend one of their monthly contact sessions; the dates and places of the contact sessions are of course notified to all MHFGA members through our mailing list every month. Local police stations have long gone unfortunately but the contact sessions at least get the officers out from behind the counter and onto the street to meet the public. In our area, the shops in Muswell Hill are partly in Muswell Hill Ward and partly in Fortis Green Ward. Constables from the adjacent wards co-operate with each other and share their efforts to ensure continuity of policing along Fortis Green Road and Muswell Hill Broadway. We have one Sergeant who is responsible for our three wards, also an Inspector overseeing all the Safer Neighbourhood Teams in Haringey.

The Ward Panels are independent of the police but perform an important role in guiding and advising the work of the Safer Neighbourhood Teams. The panels are comprised of local residents, business owners, representatives from schools, places of worship, neighbourhood watch and residents' groups. The people on the panel do not need to be formal representatives of a group but are typically people who engage with the local community and are prepared to give up a modest amount of time to support the Safer Neighbourhood Teams. The aim is for the panel to have wide representation and to reflect the local community. At the meetings, information about local crimes is provided in a 'trusted' environment and the officers say what they are doing to reduce crime in the area. The most important function of each meeting is to set 'ward priorities'; each ward is allowed three priorities at a time. Once these priorities are set the police aim to focus their safer neighbourhood work on those priorities. At every meeting the panel members are entitled to question the officers on what they are doing to address the ward priorities.

Haringey, as our local authority, takes an active role in working in partnership with the police and the Ward Panels are an important part of this – at least one of the local ward councillors attends each of the panel meetings.

The panels tend to meet about once every two to three months. The meetings are not public meetings but they are held in a community space of some sort; for example the back room of a pub. The meetings often include interesting guests – for example, the police officers assigned to liaise with our local schools, forensics officers and officers who focus on youth offenders

All of our local Ward Panels are now active and functioning and we believe that they are a valuable service to our local community. Unsurprisingly, our local Ward Panels often put burglary, street robberies and vehicle crime as priorities. Knife crime has also come to the fore in Muswell Hill due to some very concerning incidents in our area, and this is allied with the heightened awareness of the threats to young people in particular highlighted by the 'stop knife crime' initiative.

### Victorian Post Boxes

Thanks to several members who responded to the article in the September/October issue on Victorian post boxes in Muswell Hill, including Joanna Haydon-Knowell, Peter Davies and Jack Whitehead. The post boxes they refer to are on Fortis Green Road, opposite Birchwood Avenue, and Western Road off Fortis Green.

Another resident drew my attention to the story behind why the Western Road post box (*pictured*) stands slightly off-kilter. Apparently when Queen Victoria visited a friend in Western Avenue she commented on the lack of alleyways and the owner of Harewood House next door to her friend gave the alley by his property to the public. A post box was subsequently installed by the alley. When, many years later, the Post Office sent a crane to remove the post box, local residents protested and prevented the removal. Workmen were sent to reset the post box which the crane had started to remove but didn't make a very good job of it! An article in the April 2002 issue of *The Archer* reported on this story.

## From Our Archive

### Literary Men of Muswell Hill by W B Stevenson



The old Express Dairy

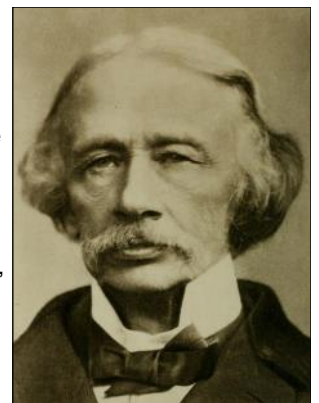
"I can remember the lipid stillness of the Muswell, and the knolls where the cowslip and the violet grew under the oaks, in the region now covered by the Alexandra Palace and its grounds. We would wander there all day and meet no-one but a carter and a milkmaid". So wrote Frederick Harrison the philosopher and critic who lived a Belle Vue until 1840: his villa was demolished in 1900. Buses and lorries roar up the hill past the Express Dairy which stands on the site: there may be a milkmaid around, but she will be serving coffee.

Harrison is only one of many literary people who sought refuge in the quiet village of Muswell Hill in Victorian times. Earlier than this, Thomas Moore the Irish poet had lived in Lalla Rookh cottage at the bottom of the hill while seeing his oriental poem of that name through the press. Who reads Moore's poem today? Yet his poetry is commemorated in the name of The Minstrel Boy in Colney Hatch Lane.

At the end of Colney Hatch Lane in a fine house called The Limes lived Richard Marshall, a famous Victorian publisher. He was followed there by C E Mudie, the greatest of "subscription librarians". Mudie's word was law with the publishers, and his purchase, or rejection, of a new novel spelt the difference between failure and success. The catalogue of the library contained the names of all the best sellers of the time. When Mudie left The Limes and it too was demolished, the Muswell Hill Library was built on part of the site – an appropriate transition.

In Fortis Green lived Coventry Patmore, one of the most prominent of Victorian poets. His long domestic poem *The Angel in the House* is little read today: but some of his poems are included in the *Oxford Book of English Verse*, and the *Oxford Book of Nineteenth Century Verse*. Patmore was highly regarded by Gerard Manley Hopkins, a much greater poet, who went to Highgate School. Highwood Lodge, where Patmore lived, still stands in Fortis Green.

Not far away at Stanley Lodge in Tetherdown, lived a more picturesque figure. William Ernest Henley, the collaborator of Robert Louis Stevenson, was a poet and a famous editor. He was a large man who walked with a crutch. He would argue furiously and then sweetly reconcile himself with his opponent. Stevenson used to call him "Burley", and on his character and physique modelled Long John Silver in *Treasure Island*. Today, too, many well-known authors, journalists and musicians live in our midst. You probably rub shoulders with them in the Broadway: for Muswell Hill, in spite of its modern bustle, is still a friendly village.

The Friends of Parkland Walk have alerted us to the fact that Haringey Council has decided to remove all dog waste bins. Dog waste will now be collected in the general rubbish bins.

The Friends have expressed concerns over the removal of dedicated dog waste bins for reasons of public health and hygiene. They were also disappointed that the council was not interested in discussing their proposal for working with the business volunteer sector to make waste bins using sustainable and recycled materials at about a fifth of the cost of the council's off-the-shelf solution.
