

Haringey Ward Boundary Review



The Local Government Boundary Commission has been carrying out a review of the ward boundaries within the borough of Haringey. These reviews are carried out from time to time and this particular review was necessary to ensure that in future there would be equality of representation across the borough given that, whilst the population is forecast to rise overall, the rate of increase will be greater in the east of the borough than in the west. A decision had previously been taken not to change the size of the Council (57 Councillors).

The outcome of the review for our part of the borough is that the present set up of three wards with three Councillors (Fortis Green, Muswell Hill and Alexandra) will be replaced by two wards with two Councillors (Muswell Hill and Alexandra Park) and one with three

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(Fortis Green). The opportunity was taken to tidy up the rather haphazard position in the town centre so that in future it will all be in a single ward – Muswell Hill. This is a positive outcome – it will, for example, make things much easier for the ward policing arrangements. The other major change is that the roads at the foot of Muswell Hill off Priory Road and Park Road, which are currently in the Muswell Hill ward, are to be moved into the Hornsey ward. The next stage of the process is that the changes have to be approved by Parliament and they are then due to take effect in time for the next borough Council elections in May 2022.

Congratulations to John!

Our Chairman, John Hajdu, was surprised and delighted to be awarded an MBE in this year's New Year Honours List for his contribution towards Holocaust awareness and education. He regularly delivers talks to schoolchildren through the agency of the Holocaust Educational Trust.

John was born in Budapest, Hungary, in 1937 and suffered persecution under both Nazi and Soviet regimes in the 1940s and 1950s. John is particularly keen to spread the word because not many people have gone through not one but two periods of persecution, firstly under the German regime and secondly under the Soviet occupation, and also because one hears mostly about what happened to the Jews in Poland and Germany but very rarely, if at all, about what happened in Hungary.

Whilst giving his talks John tells the children that it is possible with all the hardship and all the fighting in your life, to survive and create a happy life in this country.

John said that the award simply spurs him on to try to talk to as many people as possible and be an ambassador on behalf of survivors who might not be able to talk or might not want to talk about their experiences. In an interview with Sky News he admitted that recounting his story is difficult and traumatic but that it is vitally important that stories such as his should be told to future generations.

Finsbury Park Station Stays Closed

The Wells Terrace entrance/exit at Finsbury Park Station was closed with one week's notice in July 2016 ahead of the £220m development at the site. Many residents of Muswell Hill used this entrance.



The closure has caused a lot of inconvenience for those living on the other side of the station to the main entrance, the shutting down of businesses, and a great deal of congestion and delays. TfL says that it is outside its control and the responsibility of Telford Homes, the developer behind the City North Project. The entrance was due to re-open in April 2019 and then put back to December 2019. It is now scheduled to reopen in Spring 2020.

Harington students were delighted to accept a cheque from members of MHFGA, the result of the Name the Teddy Bear competition at the Wonderful Muswell Christmas Fair stall.

Harington is celebrating 40 years this year and embarking on a major fundraising and refurbishment programme, including building a second training centre on Hornsey High Street.

From an initial student intake in 1980 of 15 young people with learning difficulties and disabilities and four staff, the organisation has grown to teach employability skills in horticulture and retail, with English, Maths, IT and life skills, to around 45 full-time students per year. Dedicated job coaches help students into employment wherever possible and provide associated support, sometimes for several years.

Harington is always looking for volunteers in all areas, so if you can commit a regular slot once a week for an hour or two, or help out for a morning or afternoon in one of their two shops, please call Shireen Nasser for more details on 020 3457 7993.

House of Books on the Broadway was opened in August 2018. I had (and still have) a branch in Crouch End which has been there in a few different sites for almost 10 years. Crouch End has always been a very successful branch although the impact of Waterstones has taken some gloss off it. When it opened 10 years ago it was a group of friends who started the business and as we looked to open more branches I always wanted to open in Muswell Hill but, because we couldn't find the right shop and the rents and rates were incredibly high, we could never all agree.

When the partnership between us ended I re-opened a shop in Crouch End and waited for the right opportunity to find a location. I have lived in the area for 25 years now. Whether it be dog-walking in Highgate Woods or shopping locally I have always loved the place. The combination of great high street, amazing green spaces and the diversity of the people makes this a truly special part of London.

I really wanted to put my shop on the High Street as I genuinely believed it would add something of value to the area. The community has always been lucky in being served by bookshops, from the legendary Children's Bookshop to Muswell Hill Books and also WH Smiths. All three serve their purpose and have different titles although obviously there is some cross-over. Our slant is heavily discounted books we find from our various suppliers around the country. Most of these are sold below half their original published price and are all in mint condition. The subject areas vary but our most successful subjects are children's books and fiction although we do well with history, politics and current affairs.

We stock most of the current bestsellers at full price (with a small discount), Lonely Planet travel guides and a selection of modern classics. We stock a range of greeting cards, wrapping paper and a small selection of toys. We also order books in and if it is in stock with our wholesaler it arrives within a couple of days. We are a dog-friendly shop. If you are in the high street we would love for you to visit us and have a browse !

News from Alexandra Palace and Park

We hope that Association members and readers of this Newsletter have already visited the “new” theatre on our doorstep, the Victorian delight housed within Alexandra Palace. It’s now been over a year since it was brought back to life as part of the East Wing restoration project. The restoration has won a significant number of awards including the AJ Architecture Award in the Heritage Building category, the London Building Excellence Awards for Best Small Commercial Project, various RIBA 2019 and the London Venue Award 2019. This regional and national recognition is commendable.

If you fancy reading the full and fascinating story of the theatre then you can find “Drama at the Palace” by Nigel Willmott and Patricia Brearey, which covers the years 1873 to 1901, and the follow-up “Drama at the Palace 2” covering 1901 to 2019, at local bookshops. Many members enjoyed Nigel and Patricia’s talk to the Association last October which gave a taster of what can be found in the books.

It is of course in the performances held that a theatre comes to life and it’s great to see our theatre running a varied and high quality programme. Details of future performances at the theatre and elsewhere in the Palace can be found at:

This includes events and exhibitions held in the even newer Creativity Pavilion, recently opened also in the East Wing.

One date for the diary is Saturday 25th July when the Kaleidoscope Festival returns. First held in 2018, this year’s one-day festival includes Groove Armada, Fun Lovin’ Criminals, House Gospel Choir and Norman Jay MBE, with words and comedy from Irvine Welsh, Lauren Laverne, Reginald D Hunter, Ed Gamble, Phil Wang and Sophie Duker. There will also be immersive theatre within the rarely-opened Victorian basements, family entertainment and a street food market.

In other news, we await (at the time of writing) the outcome of the public consultation for the Palace’s car park charging proposal gathered from about 2,000 online survey responses and drop-in sessions.

Pinkham Way Alliance

Thank you for your generosity... we've reached our latest target! Our £10,000+ fees for planning consultancy at last November's North London Waste Plan (NLWP) hearing are now covered. Again, thank you.

A recap: in December, the Councils told the Planning Inspector that they'd make the 'major modifications' necessary to save the current North London Waste Plan (NLWP) from being scrapped.

We can only assume that such large revisions will require any revamped plan to go out for further consultation. When that would be is anyone's guess, but, based on long experience, it may be later rather than sooner. So, with some breathing space, I'm going to plug Europe's *only* invertebrate conservation charity.

Pinkham Way is home to several rare and endangered species and is particularly rich in beetles. In fact, Buglife wrote us a long letter that we used in support of our spoken evidence at the recent hearing. Buglife is a tiny organisation, with an income of just £1million, but it sustains invaluable work with local authorities and conservation groups.

As an example, its network of 'B-lines' for insect pollinators, extending over large parts of the UK, is a splendid achievement. Search via 'London' at <https://www.buglife.org.uk/our-work/b-lines> and you'll see this area as part of it.

If you're interested in supporting environmental charities in these worrying times for wildlife, with the UK as the most nature-depleted of developed countries, please consider Buglife.

These are Sir David Attenborough's words from the Buglife website:

"If we and the rest of the back-boned animals were to disappear overnight, the rest of the world would get on pretty well. But if invertebrates were to disappear, the world's ecosystems would collapse."



From Our Archive

The following article is taken from the Autumn 1965 issue of *Fortisman*, the forerunner of this Newsletter.

Hornsey and Harringay by W B Stevenson

Four churches have stood on the site of Hornsey's Parish Church of St. Mary. The earliest building must have been there in the 13th century, for there was a Rector in 1303. The second church was built in 1500, stones of the tower having been taken from the Bishop's Lodge in Highgate. The second church was burned down, but the old tower still remains as a landmark and the second oldest building in the Borough. The present church, the fourth in the series, was built in 1889 and many of the memorials of the old churches were brought there. An ancient brass of 1520 and a memorial to Francis Musters of 1600 are the most prominent of these.

The great park or clearing in the Hornsey forest has been the scene of a number of historic incidents. Here in Richard II's time a great assembly of noblemen and their retainers met to demonstrate their opposition to the favouritism shown to Robert de Vere, Earl of Oxford. Readers of Shakespeare's *Henry VI* will be familiar with the charges of sorcery made against Eleanor Duchess of Gloucester; it was in a lodge in Hornsey Park that she was supposed to have met Canon Southwell and Roger Bolinbroke, her fellow conspirators, and to have made wax images of the King. Some forty years later, in 1483, Richard of Gloucester, coming straight FROM Stony Stratford with young Prince Henry, and attended by a strong force of men, was met in Hornsey Park by the Lord Mayor London and his Corporation. Five hundred citizens attended them, and all joined the royal procession to London.



Hornsey village developed slowly, with cottages and small houses round the church. The most prominent estate was that of the Cozens family in 1552, pulled down in 1750, and rebuilt in 1792. In 1608 Sir Hugh Myddelton commenced his great enterprise of the New River, bringing water from the springs of Hertfordshire into London. The artificial river became a great resort for anglers and sportsmen, and the old Three Compasses Inn in High Street, Hornsey, became one of their favourite places of refreshment. Hornsey Wood Tavern in Finsbury Park was another such, and there are a number of 18th- and 19th-century pictures and engravings showing the Tavern.


Development at the back of the Library?

The Council's cabinet has identified a number of sites within the borough for possible housing development. One such site is the vacant area in Avenue Mews behind Muswell Hill library. This has been left empty for many years since it ceased to house a Council sub-depot. During that time it has remained in Council ownership and various proposals have been suggested for its use none of which came to anything.

We feel that it would make sense for this piece of ground to be finally put to good use but cannot comment in detail about the current proposal until further details are forthcoming. However, we would expect any development to be on a modest scale so that it does not overshadow the listed library building. We also think that it would be appropriate to take the opportunity to consider a mixed development for the site which included additional library accommodation as well as housing.

It is perhaps not well known that prior to the library use the site was the location for the Muswell Hill fire station (*illustrated right*). It opened in 1899.
