Member Profile

Stephanie Beer

My Muswell Hill life began more than 50 years ago when my new husband John and I moved to our first house in a terrace just off Colney Hatch Lane. A few years later, with a two-year-old bouncing off the walls and another on the way, we moved to a larger place just next to Highgate Wood, where we remain to this day. I am not sure exactly when we joined the Association but the records show we were already members in 2004.

Highgate Wood has been a central part of our lives ever since. My two boys learned to ride their bikes, kick a football and climb a tree there; my grandsons are now doing the same; and multiple family dogs have considered it their second home, including my current dog, a little black Cockapoo called Cleo.

Having got so much out of its 69 acres of ancient woodland over the decades, it only seems fair to give back, which is why I've been the Association's representative on the Highgate Wood Consultative Group for the last 10 years. Meeting twice-yearly and composed of local councillors, reps from local organisations and City of London Members, the Group provides a forum for residents and users of the Wood to influence its management.

I was also a magistrate at Haringey Magistrates Court for 33 years. It was on Bishop's Road, a short walk through Highgate Wood, before it was merged with Enfield and Camden and turned into a block of flats. It was the perfect occupation for a mother with school-age children as I could do the school run, make it to court for 9.15 and still collect the children from school at 3.30!

I have a long association with Highgate golf club, too. My husband John was already a member when we got married in 1972 and, after suffering through what I like to call the "golf widow years", I decided that if you couldn't beat them, you should join them, and became a member myself. Somewhat ironically, I also proceeded to fall in love with golf. I took a turn as Ladies Captain before accepting a role with Middlesex County Golf and overseeing its administrative merger with Middlesex Ladies, only the third county in England to merge in this way, which felt quite revolutionary at the time.

It's hard to believe how much Muswell Hill has changed over the last 50 years, from the people to the places - you just don't see as many TV presenters around Muswell Hill as you used to, and the Singer sewing machine shop, Wimpy and Woolworths have all gone! - but many things have stayed constant too, foremost among them the strong sense of community and good neighbourliness that first welcomed me to the area all those years ago. I'm proud to call Muswell Hill my home.



Pinkham Way Alliance

We'd hoped that the Inspector of the North London Waste Plan (NLWP) would remove Pinkham Way from being suitable for waste use. He didn't, but what he did was better still. He took reasons why the site is unsuitable for development – the ones we've been putting forward for years (biodiversity, flood risk, etc) - and included them in the Plan.

Importantly, he has also set out all the local (Haringey), regional (London Plan) and national planning policies that have given us the basis for our objections

We attended the June Haringey Cabinet meeting to make a deputation.

The PWA accepted the NLWP Inspector's report and agreed with Haringey Council that his inclusion of the site in the plan gave multi-layered protection for Pinkham Way. In turn, the Council acknowledged PWA's contribution, made in evidence-based arguments across multiple submissions.

The much more constructive atmosphere with Haringey has continued. There are other key points outside the NLWP Inspector's discretion. We'll pick these up in the Haringey Local Plan consultations in the autumn.

The Council encouraged PWA to submit a full response.

Current indications are:

- that climate change, green space and biodiversity will be driving issues
- that the Council intend to give proper (and welcome!) weight to protecting and enhancing the site's biodiversity

To achieve this, we consider that a Site Management Plan is essential, and are revisiting the Plan we submitted some years ago.

Prime Warden of the Shipwrights

The Company is one of the 150 or so London Livery Companies and is a charitable institution involved in helping young people embark on a career in the maritime world.

The position of Prime Warden, frequently called "Master" in other Livery companies, is held for one year and is akin to being Non Executive Chairman of the Company.

"I was very honoured to be elected Prime Warden and particularly pleased to be the first female. I have worked all my life in the shipping industry and I am delighted to be able to give something back," said Laura.

Everyman – new (historic) projector

An historic 35mm film projector is to be installed as an exhibit in the foyer of the Everyman and you are invited to the celebrations.

A Gaumont Kalee GK21 projector has been donated by David Staples (member of MHFGA) to the Everyman and will be displayed in the foyer. The GK21 was manufactured during the 1950s and is regarded by many as one of the most beautiful (and iconic) projectors ever manufactured. The Odeon Muswell Hill was at one time equipped with GK 21 projectors.

The date is still to be fixed but there will be an opportunity to watch the projector being reassembled by Nigel Wolland MBE and other volunteers from the Projected Picture Trust.

MHFGA.org is 20 years young!

Launched in 2002, the website of the Muswell Hill & Fortis Green Association was introduced to complement the traditional Newsletter in communicating with our local and not-so-local community. At the time there were fewer than 40 million websites online, and the then www.muswellhillandfortisgreenassociation.co.uk (yes, that was the first address) was a runaway success, its 12 pages seen in its first year by 34,000 visitors, 1,000 from overseas.

Today there are almost 2 billion websites to choose from, all competing with Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, TikTok and a huge raft of other social media platforms for the attention of the public. The MHFGA website has changed and grown over the period, publishing local news, expanding its unique photo and video archives, and offering maybe the most comprehensive guide to local emergency and non-emergency services. Last year, its 60 pages and 50 posts were seen by a still very respectable 4,000 visitors. Recently, the website has added Zoom and other video recordings of its public talks and plans, including publishing the Association's whole collection of Newsletters, going back to 1965.

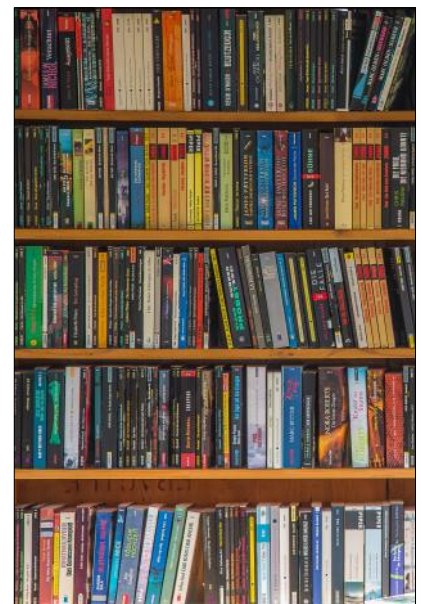

Muswell Hill Metro



Muswell Hill Old Train Station

Once upon a time you could travel by train from Alexandra Palace via Muswell Hill and Cranley Gardens to Finsbury Park. And for a moment it looked like the network could become part of the tube and expanded to the north to Bushey Heath and High Barnet, and south to Moorgate. Instead, on the 3rd July 1954, after 81 years of service, despite representations by a formidable list of local organisations (the Middlesex County Council; Finchley, Hornsey, Islington and Wood Green Borough Councils; Friern Barnet Urban District Council; the Alexandra Park Trustees; Hornsey Chamber of Commerce; and the Federation of Ratepayers' and Kindred Associations in Middlesex) the line was closed down.

The rest is history, and today the disused track has become the very much-loved Parkland Walk, the longest linear nature reserve in London. However, since the demise of the Alexandra Palace to Finsbury Park line, the idea of bringing back rail in one form or another has not gone away and a short Youtube documentary by video producer and author Geoff Marshall (a.k.a Jago Hazzard) recounts some of the past schemes, from the London Passenger Transport Board's Northern Heights to a plan to build a six-lane highway along the Parkland Walk.
