Advice from your local police team

On 5th February, we welcomed our local Sergeant Sam Hemstead and Fortis Green PCSOs Ade Taylor and Trish Chang who gave an interesting talk on the work undertaken by our safer neighbourhood teams. Sgt Hemstead explained that in London neighbourhood policing is arranged on a ward basis and that he leads the Muswell Hill, Fortis Green and Alexandra Park safer neighbourhood teams (SNT). The SNTs are dedicated to serving the local community and work closely with the local authority, community leaders and residents to agree the policing priorities for the area.

The current local priorities included burglary, robbery and motor vehicle crime in Fortis Green, and theft (shoplifting), burglary and anti-social behaviour in Muswell Hill. Last autumn there was a spike in burglaries, this was addressed by undertaking special night time patrols and the burglaries have reduced. Shoplifting is taken seriously in Muswell Hill and the police regularly patrol the shopping area and talk to the shop owners, and run special plain clothes patrols. A number of arrests for shoplifting have been made recently.

PCSOs Ade Taylor and Trish Chang gave the audience an insight into "a typical day in the life of a PCSO"; starting early in the morning with a check of the overnight crimes; then a patrol around a crime hotspot followed by meeting the public at a Contact Point in a local café; and finally a visit to some local residents to provide re-assurance following a burglary in the road. PCSOs have reduced powers compared to their Police colleagues, but not many people know that a PCSO is able to detain a suspect for 30 minutes until a Police officer is able to attend.

Local Police meetings and events are detailed on the Met Police website, examples are Cuppa with a Copper held in local cafes, Drop-in Surgeries and Walk, Talk and Do in local roads – just head to the Met Police website and type in your postcode to find your ward SNT.

The talk was rounded off with by a question and answer session and topics covered included burglaries, mopeds in the Broadway, mobile phone snatches, local school police officers, the importance of reporting every crime and crime prevention tips.

Crime prevention tips

Tip 1: Protection from distraction thefts; and an invitation to dial 999

Distraction thefts happen when fake operatives come into your home – they distract you and steal car keys, cash or anything they see lying about the place, often in the hallway. Obviously, you will check their ID, but criminals are good at faking ID and can buy convincing fake uniforms on the internet.

Here are just two things to make you suspicious:

Operatives turning up without an appointment. They may have a story that explains that it is an emergency e.g. a gas or water leak in the street, but are they telling the truth? Be suspicious of anyone who does not have an appointment.

Operatives turning up in pairs. It is highly unusual for gas and water companies to send two people to an address. Distraction thieves usually operate in pairs – one of them stands in the hallway pocketing your valuables whilst you take the other one to another part of your house.

If you refuse entry to suspicious callers, then do not hesitate to go straight to the phone and call 999. The police response team will be delighted to dash along and if they find them in the street eyeing up other potential victims they will stop them and have a chat with them.

Tip 2: Garden safety and a pruning job

Hard to believe it, but soon winter will be over and the shrubs in our front gardens will be growing again. Burglars don't like fiddling with locks and breaking down doors when passers-by can watch them in action. Make sure that there is a clear view of your front door and side entrance from the road by cutting back the shrubs before they grow and block the view of your locks. Shrubs should be below head height to prevent thieves from hiding behind them.

Tip 3: Burglaries usually happen in empty homes

Burglaries almost invariably happen in empty homes, so make sure that your home looks as if it is occupied when you are away – lights which go on and off automatically are an obvious way to do this. If someone is popping in to feed the cat, ask them to open and close the curtains. Video doorbells are also a deterrent as the burglars often ring the bell first to check that a house is empty.

If you are at home and a burglar gets into your house, then you should never confront them. If you make your presence known, the burglar is likely to leave. Phone 999 as soon as it is safe to do so.

The ninth in our series on local Green Plaques - Charlotte Riddell: More than Gothic

The Green Plaques, originally an idea of the then Chair of the Muswell Hill and Fortis Green Association, John Hajdu, were subsequently adopted for the whole of Haringey. This plaque was unveiled on 8th March 2010, International Women's Day, at St Ann's Hospital entrance in Hangar Lane (today's St Ann's Road) to honour her contribution to literature and commemorate her time in the borough.

When Charlotte Riddell (1832-1906) came to Haringey, the area was still largely undeveloped, with open fields, farms, and a few scattered houses. Its peaceful countryside atmosphere gave her respite from London's business hustle, which featured in many of her works.



By then, she had already established herself as a significant figure in Victorian literary culture, both a prolific novelist and a pioneering female publisher. From 1868 to 1873, she lived in St. John's Lodge, a prominent 19th-century residence in Haringey, where she played a crucial role in shaping mid-Victorian literature through her fictional depictions of business life, supernatural tales, and editorial work.

Though also labelled 'Gothic' and sensationalist' writer, Riddell was one of the few Victorian novelists to specialise in commercial and financial themes, a subject often overlooked in fiction. Her novels provided a realistic portrayal of the London business world, stock exchange, and financial struggles, reflecting the economic anxieties of the period. Works like *Above Suspicion* (1870) and *Austin Friars* (1871) explored the tensions between morality and commerce, demonstrating her deep understanding of business life. Her ability to integrate detailed financial dealings into compelling narratives set her apart from other Victorian writers.




Her 1870 novel *A Struggle for Fame* is particularly significant as a semi-autobiographical account of a female writer navigating the literary marketplace. It highlights women's difficulties in gaining recognition and financial security in the publishing industry. Riddell's heroines, often navigating financial struggles and the male-dominated business world, challenged traditional domestic roles. Victorian critics sometimes viewed this as unfeminine, though her novels still reinforced Victorian values like duty, morality, and perseverance. Some readers appreciated her practical, hardworking women, while others preferred more sentimental, romanticized female portrayals. Despite mixed reactions, Riddell's progressive yet restrained feminism helped shape literary discussions on women's roles in Victorian business and society.

In 1868, Riddell became the sole proprietor and editor of *St. James's Magazine*, an unusual and bold move for a woman in the male-dominated Victorian publishing world. Under her leadership, the magazine published a mix of fiction, literary criticism, and essays, appealing to a middle-class audience. It also supported emerging

writers, helping to shape public taste, and reinforcing her influence on Victorian literary culture.

Despite financial difficulties, she sustained the magazine for five years, demonstrating remarkable resilience and business acumen. During this time, she continued to write and publish her fiction, using her magazine to engage readers with realist and supernatural themes, blending the Gothic with domestic realism, reflecting Victorian anxieties about the unknown.

Charlotte Riddell wrote over fifty books, which are now in the public domain and downloadable for free from several online platforms, such as Project Gutenberg (gutenberg.org), the Internet Archive (archive.org), Google Books (books.google.com), and Wikisource (en.wikisource.org).



Bill Jago - in memorium

Many of members of the Association will remember Bill Jago, who sadly died on Boxing Day. Bill and his wife, Win, moved into Birchwood Avenue, where I lived, in the early 1970s. They joined the Association soon afterwards and were members for over 50 years.

Bill and I comprised the Association's anti-graffiti and flyposting team or, as one Ham&High headline had it, "OAPs in Graffiti Busting Swoop". We used to clear graffiti and flyposting on Muswell Hill Broadway on behalf of the Association from 2003 until Covid -19 arrived. We never resumed it after lockdown, but these nuisances have not returned to a serious extent, which pleased both of us. We were satisfied that our experience of the effects of our removal of graffiti supported the hypothesis that the less graffiti there is in an area, the less new graffiti it attracts. The same applies to flyposting.



Bill had an amazingly good memory, but particularly about cars. He knew every car whose driver lived in our road, and he knew their house number. It was very useful when we had to remove all the cars from the road for the Birchwood Avenue centenary street party in 2006.

At about that time I received a letter from the police saying that our car had been seen driving dangerously in Grand Avenue and giving the time and date at which this was alleged to have occurred. A form was enclosed which I had to complete and return. It so happened that on that day we had a visitor, and our car was parked in front of our house for the whole of the period in question.

I told Bill about this, saying it was lucky that we had an independent witness. He said that there was a car identical to ours with a similar number plate, which he thought must "live" close to our road. He remembered its number! I filled in the form, giving the information supplied by Bill, and that was the last I heard of it. He was a good friend.


